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General Subject Description

The aim of the subject is to raise awareness and knowledge of the role of sociological processes in urbanism and to recognize the relationships of the spatial structure of settlements, living environment, housing issues and sociology.

Learning Outcomes

- Understanding the various processes and mechanism of cities related to urban sociology and the relationships of spatial structure and social structure of the cities and settlements.
- Students should be able to make proposals for improving the urban life and treating different sociological problems in settlements and urban areas, such as segregation and the issues of complex social rehabilitation programs.
- Students should be able to present a semester task about describing and evaluating issues related to urban sociology on a defined urban area.

Subject content

- Urban sociology as an independent science. The subject, notions and theories of urban sociology. The village and the different approaches to the concept of the city.
- Urbanization and functionalism. Social space analysis. The relationships of spatial structure and social structure.
- Historical overview, the "Melting pot", the Chicago school, theories of urban ecology, the classical models of urban structure. Urbanism as a way of life.
- The role of the residence, housing conditions, location and neighbourhoods. Housing quality indicators. Social inequality and segregation.
- The development of the network of Hungarian cities and settlements and its transformation after 1945, the impact of socio-economic transformation on the towns and villages.
- Social rehabilitation of urban areas, presentation of segregated areas and the methods of treating the problem of segregation.
- Urban sociology related to problems of housing. Social housing, "affordable housing", social architecture, voluntary house building.
- Changes and challenges of urban sociology in the 21st century.

Examination and evaluation system

In all cases. Annex 5 of the Statutes of the University of Pécs, the Code of Studies and Examinations (CSE) of the University of Pécs shall prevail. https://english.mik.pte.hu/codes-and-regulations

Attending is required all classes, and will impact the grade. Unexcused absences will adversely affect the grade, and in case of absence from more than 15% of the total number of lesson (it is max. 2 lesson) will be grounds for failing the class. To be in class at the beginning time and stay until the scheduled end of the lesson is required, tardiness of more than 20 minutes will be counted as an absence. In the case of an illness or family emergency, the student must present a valid excuse, such as a doctor's note.

The highest possible grade on the late semester task (after Study Period before Exam Period) is '2'.

Grading will follow the course structure with the following weight:

- Presentation of the topic of the semester project in the beginning of the semester: 20%.
- Attendance of classes regarding all efforts, attitude, progress and participation on discussions: 30 %
- Final studies and presentations of the semester project: 50%

The final grade will be based on the following guidelines:

(Grade 5) Outstanding work. Execution of work is thoroughly complete and demonstrates a superior level of achievement overall with a clear attention to details and also the level of the presentation is excellent. The student is able to synthesize the course material with new concepts and ideas in a thoughtful manner, and is able to communicate and articulate those ideas in an exemplary fashion in.

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(**Grade 4**) **High quality work.** Student work demonstrates a high level of craft, consistency, and thoroughness throughout the documentation and the presentation of the semester task.

The student demonstrates a level of thoughtfulness in addressing concepts and ideas, and participates in group discussions. Work may demonstrate excellence but less consistently than an '5' student.

(**Grade 3**) **Satisfactory work.** Student work addresses all of the semester task objectives with few minor or major problems. Documentation and presentation is complete and satisfactory, exhibiting minor problems in craft and detail.

(Grade 2) Less than satisfactory work. Documentation and presentation of the semester task is substandard, incomplete in significant ways, and lacks craft and attention to detail.

(**Grade 1**) **Unsatisfactory work.** Work exhibits several major and minor problems with basic conceptual premise, lacking both intention and resolution. Documentation and presentation of semester task is severely lacking, and is weak in clarity, craft and completeness.

Task description

To make a study and a ppt presentation about the relationships between sociology and housing conditions in a selected settlement or defined urban residential area with problematic social issues

The analysis should focus on the followings:

1. DEMOGRAPHY

- Analysis of demographic situation and trends in the selected area.
- Own opinion about the ideal demographic changes in the selected area.

2. SOCIOLOGY

- Characteristics of social problems and treatment methods. Economic and working conditions, job and business opportunities and problems of unemployment.
- Own proposal about managing social problems on the selected area.

3. SEGREGATION

- Segregated areas and their management.
- The notion of "dwelling" in critical areas of housing.
- Existing programs and own proposals for social rehabilitation and urban renewal of the selected site.

4. HOUSING

- Analysis of housing conditions and housing problems in the selected area. How does the housing stock serve the housing needs of the local community? How do the users change or add contents/function of housing? Issues of "personalisation" and regulation.
- Affordability of housing, problems and possibilities of financing.
- Describing own proposals about managing housing problems on the selected area.

5. URBAN ENVIRONMENT

- How does the urban environment (public buildings, public urban spaces, green areas, conditions of commerce, education, care of children, culture, health, leisure and recreation) meet the social needs of the local community?
- Own proposal about improving the urban environment in the selected area.

The study should contain photos of the selected area, diagrams and graphs showing statistics and trends, text analysis of 10-15 pages and list of references.

The study should be also presented in a ppt form during the last 3 classes of the semester! A discussion will be done after each presentation.
